# Fresno Council of Governments DBE Goal Setting Methodology October 2021 – September 2024

#### I. In General

The Fresno Council of Governments (FCOG) is a sub recipient of the State Department of Transportation (CALTRANS) for Consolidated Planning Grant funds which include FHWA PL, FTA 5303, FTA 5304, and FTA 5311(f). FCOG is also a direct recipient from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) through TRAMS for FTA 5339 and FTA 5310 funds. This methodology will incorporate the federal funds FCOG receives through the state for our planning program and FTA 5339 funds received directly from FTA .

Fresno Area Express (FAX), the major urban transit operator in Fresno County in partnership with the FCOG, has a direct TRAMS grant relationship with FTA for FTA 5307 Urbanized Area Apportionments. FAX prepares and administrates a separate DBE program in compliance with 49 CFR Part 26 for procurements specific to FAX transit operations. Activities associated with FAX's procurements and DBE program compliance are reported separately to FTA by FAX and are not duplicated in FCOG's methodology.

FCOG awards FTA 5310 apportionments for purchase of transit vehicles which are exempt from the DBE program. However, transit vehicles acquired through the FTA 5310 program are purchased from a DBE-certified transit vehicle manufacture (TVM) registered on FTA's website at;

Fresno County Rural Transit Agency (FCRTA) provides public transit services to the rural cities and unincorporated areas in Fresno County. FTA awarded FCRTA a \$5 million FTA 5339 grant to build a transit maintenance facility. FCRTA does not have a direct TRAMS relationship with FTA therefore FCOG will administrate this grant through TRAMS and has included the contracting opportunities for this project in this methodology.

The FCOG adopted DBE goals and program are posted to our website under a sub heading, "Agenda/Info \ DBE". We also post the minutes of our public hearing adopting our goals under the agenda section of the website. Here is the link to the DBE Section.

### II. Contracting Opportunities

Annually we identify a variety of technical Transportation Planning studies in our Overall Work Program and Budget (OWP) that will provide contracting opportunities. These contracting opportunities are open to prime contractors as well as subcontractors and procurements are scoped to facilitate DBE subcontracting. During the year we solicit proposals through an RFP process in which we notify prospective consultants of our DBE program and contract requirements. The RFPs are sent to firms in our Bidders Listing which includes DBE firms as well as linking to our official website and Facebook page. Many of our studies are complex and require various skill sets so prospective consultants typically team with various sub consultants to tailor a proposal to suit our requirements providing a natural unbinding of large contracts into smaller units. During the selection process we may discuss specific issues with individual firms regarding the project, our contract requirements, or DBE program. Depending on the project we may conduct face to face interviews with prospective consultants. We issue a prime contract to the winning proposal to the prime contractor who subcontracts with the various firms that team up for their proposal.

FCOG has identified \$16 million in contracting opportunities in Table 1.

To facilitate subcontracting, FCOG separates contracting opportunities by NAICS code to develop the most refined data available of work grouped into primary categories corresponding to data found in the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) and the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns Database (USCPD).

FCOG pro rates the percentage of each NAICS code to total Federal Funds to determine how each NAICS will be weighted in the Base Calculation per Table 2.

### III. Step One Base Calculation

To establish FCOG's base availability of willing DBE's FCOG accessed the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) which is a state wide listing of registered DBEs. FCOG considered identifying our market area as a number of counties surrounding Fresno county, however this proved problematic when comparing the CUCP to the national census database as the CUPC counts DBEs in the county they do business in, regardless of their domiciled address, whereas the national census database counts business only by domiciled address. In order to have an apples to apples comparison the state wide CUCP DBE database must be compared with the statewide national census database. A county by county comparison would result in duplicate counting of DBEs. FCOG therefor identifies our market areas as the State of California. This is also more consistent with our planning consultant procurements which are domiciled all around the state. The number of DBEs registered in the CUCP for the selected market area becomes the numerator of the Base calculation.

To establish the number of established business' in our market area FCOG consulted the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns database (USCPD). The number of firms registered in the USCPD for the selected market area becomes the denominator for the Base Calculation

The Weighted Percentage calculated in Table 2 is then multiplied by the DBE Availability Percentage calculated in Table 3a to arrive at a base goal by NAICS code. The sum of all the goals are added together to arrive at the Total Step I Base Goal.

### IV. Step Two – Adjusting the Base figure.

The federal regulations suggest it may be appropriate to consider adjusting the Base Goal to reflect past DBE participation by developing a mean distribution of results and selecting the median year, however this is only feasible if the program is similar from year to year. In this case, the construction of FCRTA's Bus Maintenance facility, representing 58% of our proposed contracting opportunities is unique in our experience, and will add a new level of complexity to our program which is typically based on planning procurements. For this reason, it is not appropriate to adjust the base goal for prior year experience. However, for the record the results of our prior program is provided.

The regulations also propose that Disparity Studies and Bidders Listings may be used to adjust the goal.

#### **Disparity Studies**

In 2012 the State Department of Transportation hired BBC Research and Consulting to perform a disparity study assessing DBE participation in Federal Highway Administration projects that revealed statistically significant underutilization of six groups, African American, Asian Pacific American, Native American, Women, Hispanic Males and Subcontinent Asian Males. BBC is considered as one of the premier data sources for disparity analysis. The Federal Highway Administration approved the State Department of Transportation's Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program on the basis of this disparity study and these underutilized groups became the standard for reporting DBE experience on the Uniform Report of DBE Commitments/Awards and Payments format used by Federal Transit Administration and Caltrans. This analysis was updated in 2016.

In 2019 Caltrans Division of Rail and Mass Transit (DRMT) hired BBC Research and Consulting to perform a disparity study assessing DBE participation in Federal Transit Administration Public Transit projects. The study found that three of the groups determined to be underutilized by the previous studies, Black American, Hispanic American, and Native American continued to exhibit disparity indices substantially below parity, however two of the groups, Women and Subcontinent Asian American were only slightly below parity, and Asian Pacific American had improved to the point they did not exhibit disparity between participation and availability. The study also found that DBEs could expect to receive 1.7% of Caltrans FTA funded prime contract and subcontract dollars based on their availability for that work and proposed Caltrans could calculate their Step One base goal at 1.7%. However an analysis of Caltrans actual awards between October 2014 and September 2017 demonstrated that Caltrans actual utilization was higher and proposed a step-two adjustment that resulted in DRMT's adopted DBE goal of 4.8%.

Being concerned primarily with Transit procurements and considering the Bus Maintenance Facility included in our contracting opportunities, the DRMT study appears to provide the most relevance to our program. Our Base Goal, calculated using the CUCP and USCPD does not appear unreasonable in light of DRMT's adopted goal and we propose no adjustment based on disparity analysis

#### **Bidders Listing**

In order to focus more precisely on the firms interested in performing our specialized studies, we compile a bidders list from a contractor data base we have built over the years of all firms ready, willing, and able to compete for DOT assisted contracts through our technical planning process, including firms that are certified DBEs. We use the data base to solicit proposals through a Request for Proposal process. We contact everyone in the database annually, inviting interested firms to update their records, report NCIAS codes, DBE status, etc. We use the result of this exchange to update the database. We use the ratio of DBE firms registered in our data base, to the total of all firms as a method of comparing our base calculation based on the CUCP and USCPD. Our bidders list presently has 258 firms in it of which 13 are DBE, equating to a base goal of 5.04% which is a little lower but not inconsistent with our Base Goal, calculated using the CUCP and USCPD. We propose no adjustment based on our Bidders Listing.

### V. Race Neutral / Race Conscious

Per section 26.51 of 49 CFR Part 26, we are required to meet the maximum feasible portion of our goal using Race Neutral methodology. Our previous overall goals have been 100% race neutral and 0% race conscious. Our record of reasonable DBE participation using 100% race neutral measures reinforces continued usage of the 100% race neutral methodology. We reserve the option to apply race conscious measures if applicable, however, setting specific Race Conscious goals are problematic in that 48 FR 33437-38; July 21, 1983, strictly prohibits quotas or set—asides under any circumstances on DOT-assisted contracts and mandated set-asides can only be used as a means of last resort for redressing egregious discrimination. We have identified no instances of egregious discrimination in our program.

In addition California Proposition 209 amending the California State Constitution, passed by the voters in 1996 and reaffirmed in 2020, stated that public institutions cannot discriminate against or grant preferential treatment to persons on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin in public employment, public education, and public contracting.

In light of federal and state law, Race Conscious procedures must be judiciously applied, if at all and only if applicable, by placing an emphasis on Good Faith Efforts.

Race Neutral goal = 7.04% Race Conscious goal = 0%

### VI. Small Business Participation

Part of our good faith effort implementation of the DBE Program, includes the active implementation to foster small business participation. Our contracting requirements are structured to facilitate competition by small businesses, and we take all reasonable steps to eliminate obstacles to their participation, including unnecessary and unjustified bundling of contract requirements that may preclude small business participation as prime contractors or subcontractors. A reasonable number of prime contracts shall be of a size that small businesses, including DBEs, can reasonably perform.

Our procurement program is open to all small businesses, including DBEs, regardless of their location, and there are no limits on the number of contracts that can be awarded. Every effort will be made to avoid creating barriers. Assistance is provided to small business, including DBEs, in overcoming barriers to participation in all methods of procurement. Fresno COG staff shall offer the following assistance to DBEs and other small businesses:

Information on organization and contractual needs;

Instructions for preparation of bid specifications, procurement policy procedures, and general bid requirements;

Information on specific reasons for unsuccessful bids through debriefing sessions; Projected procurement opportunities;

Instruction of job performance requirements

### VII. Public Participation

Fresno COG kicked off the most recent update to the Public Participation Plan (PPP) on February 19<sup>th</sup> 2020 in a public conference call. The draft PPP was released for 45-day review and comment on March 3, 2020 through April 17, 2020. A notice was published in the Fresno Bee March 2 and April 29. Notices were also published in Vida En El Valle, the local Spanish speaking newspaper, on March 11 and April 29. COG's Newsletter, "Coming Up At Fresno COG" published articles providing details and requesting feedback, providing links to the PPP. Documents and notifications were sent out to more than 3,000 subscribers on February 6, March 9, April 16, and May 1. The draft documents and all public notices remained on the "Get Involved" link in Fresno COG's webpage throughout the review and comment period. At the May 28, 2020 Fresno COG policy board meeting the board reviewed the draft PPP, opened a public hearing and received comments. The PPP was adopted in public hearing on June 25, 2020. On June 28, 2021, at the conclusion of FCOG's quadrennial certification review, FHWA and FTA issued a joint summary report stating, "Fresno COG has done an excellent job in the development of their public facing documents. The documents are well written. succinct, and easy for the public to understand".

Fresno COG has an active Public Participation Plan that provides direction for public activities conducted by Fresno COG and contains the requirements, procedures,

strategies and techniques used by Fresno COG to communicate with the public and appropriate, affected agencies. This plan defines a comprehensive process that outlines roles, responsibilities, and key decisions points for consulting with public agencies, the transportation sector, transportation providers, and other interested parties, providing reasonable opportunities to be involved in the metropolitan planning and procurement process.

Fresno COG maintains an active Facebook page where conference invitations, public notices, surveys, webinars, request for proposals for consulting projects and links to related content and news worthy events are posted.

On March 25, 2020 the FCOG Facebook page linked to the Caltrans publication, "California Roars Back" which includes links to Caltrans public process including featuring a report on the Largest Small Businesses Relief Program in the Nation to register for Caltrans DBE Summit "Equity Matters" that was held on March 30, 2021.

On March 9, 2020 and May 5, 2021 links were provided for a public discussion regarding planned development in the Reverse Triangle Industrial Area.

On June 23, 2020 Fresno COG invited the public to participate in the development of two year process to develop a Regional Transportation Plan update. Subsequent invitations were posted in both English and Spanish to participate in public discussions and surveys between September 9 and October 22, 2020.

On July 10, 2020 and January 21, 2021 Fresno COG announced a series of public workshops on the Eastside Transportation Corridor Improvement Study, including a new website <a href="https://www.planfresno.com">www.planfresno.com</a>.

Between October 22, 2020 and February 17 2021 Fresno COG held a series of public discussions, open houses, and surveys on the State Route 41 and Avenue 9 Corridor Plan.

On December 1, 2020 Fresno COG linked a small business Marketing Class webinar put on the by the local Air District to assist small employer acclimating to COVID19. Fresno COG also linked a number of surveys for employers dealing with telecommute issues. .

Between March 8 and April 20, 2021 Fresno COG linked surveys and webinars inviting public engagement on FCOG's Sustainable Communities Strategy.

On May 19, 2021 a virtual workshop was held focusing on FCOG's Reginal Housing Needs Allocation Plan.

Fresno COG maintains a database by NAICS code, including DBEs of contractors interested in participating in our procurement program. We share this listing with similar agencies, monitor trade publications and attendance at various government training and consultation seminars keeping an eye open for firms qualified to perform the specialized transportation planning studies representative of a regional Metropolitan Planning Agency. Anyone may request listing in our database. We periodically contact all contractors in our data base, including DBEs, explaining our program and requesting updated information on their DBE status. We publish notice in the region's major newspaper of circulation notifying of potential contracting opportunities, explaining our DBE procurement program and inviting attendance and comment at our annual DBE public hearing. We also post notices and information relevant to our DBE program on our website and Facebook page.

On June 11, 2020 Fresno COG notified the consultants listed in our regional bidders list, inviting them to update their DBE status. A link is also posted to the Fresno COG website inviting interested DBEs to register in our data base, providing registration forms, instructions and a link to NAICS codes. A public notice was published on April 27, 2021, appearing in the Fresno Bee and Vida En El Valle, informing the public of our DBE Goal Setting Methodology public hearing scheduled for May 27, 2021 providing address, phone number and inviting comments. Minutes for the May 27, 2021 meeting, including the presentation of Agenda Item IIIB. Public Hearing Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Goal 2021-22 through 2023-24 and the adoption of Resolution 2021-15 setting the DBE goals at 7.04% are attached to this methodology.

### VIII. Final Adjusted Goal

In compliance with 49 CFR Part 26, Fresno COG submits the final DBE Goal for the period 2021-22 through 2023-24 at 7.04%.

The Fresno Council of Governments maintains a race neutral DBE program in compliance with 49 CFR Part 26. Recently the Federal Highway administration and State Department of Transportation issued revised guidance concerning our DBE program pursuant to a 2016 Disparity Study that seven groups presumed to be disadvantaged are underutilized as defined by the Code of Federal Regulations, 49 CFR Part 26. Three groups exhibited disparity substantially below parity – Black American, Hispanic American and Native American. Two groups exhibited disparity below parity but did not reach the threshold to be considered substantial – white woman- owned business and Subcontinent Asian American.

#### **Public Notice**

The Fresno Council of Governments, in accordance with 49 CFR Part 26, adopts a triennial disadvantaged business enterprise (DBE) goal to apply in Fresno COG awarded contracts funded with federal or state grants. On May 27, 2021, in public hearing, the Fresno COG Policy Board will adopt Resolution 2021-15, approving the three year goal for 2021-22 through 2023-24. The goal applies to a variety of technical transportation and air quality related studies funded by Federal Highways, and Federal Transit Administration programs itemized in the Fresno COG 2021-22 Overall Work Program and budget. Also included is a Federal Transit Administration 5339 grant passed on to Fresno Rural Transit Agency to build a transit maintenance facility.

The triennial DBE goal takes into consideration the availability of certified DBE's in Fresno COG's local market area. It also considers a Disparity Study done by the state Department of Transportation which determined three groups exhibited disparity indices substantially below parity and are presumed to be disadvantaged; Black American, Hispanic American and Native American. Two additional groups displayed disparity indices below parity but did not reach the threshold considered substantial; White Woman-Owned Business and Subcontinent Asian American.

Request for proposals will be solicited from qualified consultants at various times during the fiscal year. Any firm with technical qualifications to perform these projects may apply to be added to Fresno COG's RFP listing. Firms wishing to qualify as a DBE must provide a current certification in compliance with 49 CFR Part 26, issued by the State of California, Department of Transportation, the National Economic Development Administration, the City of Fresno, the County of Fresno or some other certifying governmental agency.

The Conference Room is accessible to the disabled. Individuals with disabilities may call Fresno COG (with 3-working day advance notice) to request auxiliary aids necessary to participate in the public hearing. Translation services are available (with 3-day advance notice) to participants speaking any language with available professional translation services. The annual public hearing will held on May 27, 2021 in the Sequoia Room at the Fresno COG office. Remote attendees may dial in.

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

**Quorum:** At the start of the meeting, there were 15 members representing 99.59% of the population. There was a quorum to conduct business. (Clovis, Coalinga, Firebaugh, Fowler, Fresno City, Huron, Kerman, Kingsburg, Mendota, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, Selma and Fresno County).

The meeting was called to order at 5:31 p.m. by Mayor Cardenas (Fowler), Chair.

#### I. TRANSPORTATION ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

#### A. Amendment No. 6 Measure C Transportation Improvement Expenditure Plan (Les Beshears) [ACTION]

Mr. Beshears (FCOG) reported that last month, COG staff gave a detailed presentation (attached) on a proposed amendment to the (2006) Measure C Expenditure Plan. If the Fresno COG and FCTA boards, adopt Amendment No. 6, it would place the SR 41 South project (Elkhorn Avenue to Excelsior Avenue) into the Measure C Regional "Rural" Tier One program. As discussed extensively over the last several months, SR 41 South is a long-awaited safety project to complete the last six-mile gap in the four-lane divided expressway in Fresno County. As highlighted at last month's Policy Board meeting, there are many reasons to consider amending the SR 41 South project into the Measure C Expenditure Plan. To summarize those reasons:

- Widening SR 41 from two to four lanes was an identified project in the original 1987 Measure C Plan.
- Following the 1986 Measure C Expenditure Plan, a six-mile unimproved gap between Elkhorn and Excelsior avenues still remained.
- The project was not included in the 2006 Measure C Expenditure Plan because all parties understood that Caltrans was responsible for the project and would provide funding.

- The Caltrans-proposed project fell out of the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) due to funding issues at the state level.
- Serious accidents along the unimproved corridor have increased over time, including five fatal accidents over a three-month period in late 2020.
- To date, the state and region have committed \$10 million to completing design work and right-of-way acquisition.
- Caltrans/CTC have expressed support for developing a comprehensive funding partnership with the region to fund construction.
- Given the continual erosion of state transportation funding and a shifting focus by the state away from highway projects, this may represent a last chance to secure significant state funding to complete the gap closure project.
- The cost of the construction project is estimated at \$61 million.
- Caltrans has advised that \$14.5 million in State Highway Operations Protection funding may be used to reduce the unfunded amount to \$46.5 million.
- When STIP estimates come out in June, FCTA/COG staff would like to begin to negotiate an equitable state and regional funding plan to fund the project.
- COG/FCTA staff have identified several funding sources and strategies to be used in combination with regional Measure C funds to leverage future state and federal funds to ensure the schedules of existing projects in the

Measure C Regional "Rural" Program are not impacted. These funds include:

- 1. Interregional Transportation Funds (ITIP)
- 2. Regional Transportation Improvement Program Funds (RTIP)
- 3. Federal COVID Relief Funds
- 4. Federal RAISE and INFRA grants
- 5. President Biden's \$2.3 trillion American Jobs infrastructure initiative.
- 6. State Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (SB 1) competitive and formula grants
- 7. Congressional earmarks

Given the upcoming funding negotiations with Caltrans/CTC and the uncertainty of what the final funding package will look like, the SR 41 South project would be amended into the 2006 Measure C Expenditure Plan in a "generic" manner with no defined funding at this time. Once the FCTA/COG staff have negotiated the funding plan, actual dollars amounts will be provided for each phase of the project consistent with historical practice. Following Fresno COG's action on the proposed 2006 Measure C Amendment No. 6, it will move forward to the FCTA Board for their consideration in June.

Public comments received by those effected by traffic accidents in this are. Assemblymember Patterson spoke to the need for the project to be include.

After an opportunity for public comment, Mayor Yep (Kerman) motioned and Mayor Beltran (Parlier) seconded to approve Amendment No. 6/Resolution 2021-14, understanding the action is advisory to the COG Policy Board. The motion passed.

#### B. Measure C Renewal Update (Tony Boren) [INFORMATION]

Mr. Boren (FCOG) provided a brief update on the status of the Measure C renewal efforts underway with the various boards and committees.

Dr. Richard Bernard (FM3 Research), reported and presented on the Fresno County Transportation Baseline Issue survey.

This item was informational only; no further action was required.

#### C. Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy

#### 1. SCS Strategies and Indicator Public Engagement Survey (Brenda Veenendaal) [INFORMATION]

Ms. Veenendaal (FCOG) reported that Fresno COG's Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) Strategies and Indicators Survey was open from March 26-April 25. It outlined five scenario concepts, asking the public what they liked and didn't like about each one. It also asked participants to prioritize groupings of SCS indicators. The online, interactive survey, was available in English and Spanish -- with hard copy versions available to download in English, Spanish, and Hmong. All survey options were accessible through direct links or through the PlanFresno.com website.

The surveys was publicized using the following strategies: Videos, Multiple e-newsletters, Hard-copy surveys in three languages, Email-share requests sent from COG staff, Hosted a public Zoom webinar and a Facebook Live meeting, Website posts with videos and Organic and boosted posts.

The survey was viewed 1,326 times receiving responses from 421 respondents. Links to the Participant Demographics and Strategies/Indicators Comments are posted on <a href="https://www.PlanFresno.com">www.PlanFresno.com</a>. Fresno COG staff will provide a presentation regarding the survey respondent demographics during the Policy Board meeting.

This item was informational only; no further action was required.

#### 2. Sustainable Communities Strategy Scenario Selection (Seth Scott) [ACTION]

Mr. Scott (FCOG) reported that the 2022 Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) will include three scenarios, each of which will be fully analyzed and compared to one another by way of performance indicators. The five scenario concepts that the COG Policy Board approved for consideration were presented to the public for input in the SCS public outreach survey, and the results of that effort were just presented to this body.

COG staff is seeking approval for three of these five scenario concepts to be included in the 2022 SCS for full analysis. The Board is welcomed to consider the results of the public outreach survey as a guide in this recommendation. The three scenarios selected will be modeled, and further analyzed; and their performance results will be presented in the fall, at which point a preferred scenario will be chosen from among them. The performance results for all three scenarios will be published in the 2022 Regional Transportation Plan, SCS chapter.

After an opportunity for public comment, Mayor Leon (Huron) motioned and Mayor Ontiveros (Sanger) seconded to recommend the Policy Board include scenarios A, B and  $\underline{C}$  for analysis in the 2022 RTP/SCS. The motion passed.

#### 3. Performance Indicator Selection (Seth Scott) [ACTION]

Mr. Scott (FCOG) reported the ability to choose a preferred scenario from the three that will be analyzed in the 2022 Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) depends on a robust suite of data that clearly and comprehensively represents how each scenario performs. These metrics, called performance indicators, are the chief points of comparison that will inform selecting a preferred scenario. As such, the indicators chosen for analysis should be thorough enough to tell the complete story of a scenario's performance and concise enough to allow for meaningful and informed engagement from decision makers, stakeholders and the public.

COG staff is asking for a recommendation of a suite of performance indicators that tell the most complete story in the most concise way. The indicators chosen will form the basis of how scenarios are analyzed and compared to one another and will be reported in addition to seven fixed indicators that have been determined essential in describing the nature of each scenario. There will also be one environmental justice indicator recommended by the EJ Subcommittee. This body is welcome to consider the results from the SCS public outreach survey in making this recommendation.

Due to input from the RTP Roundtable on 5/26, staff has requested that the EJ indicator approval be tabled until the EJ Subcommittee can revisit the issue and provide clarification and/or amend their recommendation.

After an opportunity for public comment, Mayor Valdez (Firebaugh) motioned and Mayor Flores (Clovis) seconded to recommend the following performance indicators be included in the 2022 RTP/SCS (in addition to the seven fixed indicators): net years of life gained, air pollution levels, accessibility to jobs, environmental resource land consumed, active transportation infrastructure, and road maintenance improvements. One additional EJ indicator will be approved for inclusion at a later date. The motion passed.

#### D. 2021-22 through 2023-24 Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Goal (Les Beshears) [ACTION]

Mr. Beshears (FCOG) reported that The Fresno Council of Governments, in accordance with 49 CFR Part 26, adopts a triennial disadvantaged business enterprise (DBE) goal to apply to Fresno COG awarded contracts funded with federal or state grants. The goal applies to a variety of technical transportation and air quality related studies funded by Federal

Highways, and Federal Transit Administration programs itemized in the Fresno COG Overall Work Program and Budget. Also included is a Federal Transit Administration 5339 grant passed on to Fresno County Rural Transit Agency.

During the 2020-21 fiscal year we did 14 procurements totaling \$2,049,593. Overall DBE participation was \$623,391 or 30%.

The 2021-22 Overall work program and budget identifies \$16 million in contracting opportunities that will be subject to procurement during the fiscal year. This represents a significant increase in contracting opportunities from previous years resulting from a \$10 million FTA 5339 grant and a \$10 million State REAP grant and also represents a major expansion of the NAICS categories of vendors in our procurement market.

Request for proposals will be solicited from qualified consultants at various times during the 2021-22 through 2023-24 fiscal years. Any firm with technical qualifications to perform these studies or projects may apply to be added to Fresno COG's RFP listing. Firms wishing to qualify as a DBE must provide a current certification in compliance with 49 CFR Part 26, issued by the State of California, Department of Transportation, the National Economic Development Administration, the City of Fresno, the County of Fresno or some other certifying governmental agency.

The triennial DBE goal takes into consideration the availability of certified DBE's in Fresno COG's market area. It also considers Disparity Studies done by the state Department of Transportation in 2016 and 2019 which determined three groups exhibited disparity indices substantially below parity and are presumed to be disadvantaged; Black American, Hispanic American and Native American. Two additional groups displayed disparity indices below parity but did not reach the threshold considered substantial; White Woman-Owned Business and Subcontinent Asian American.

Staff obtained a copy of the state California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) database for the purposes of analyzing our procurement market by NAICS Code. This analysis was compared to the U.S. Census Bureau's County Business Patterns to determine the availability of DBE's willing and able to perform services in our market area. With this data FCOG calculated the Step 1 Base Goal required by federal regulations at 7.14%.

Regulations also provide for a Step 2 adjustment that may consider other factors to fine tune the goal to our procurement market including Disparity Studies.

In setting their 2020-2022 DBE Goal the Caltrans Department of Rail and Mass Transit (DRMT) did a Disparity Study and calculated a Step One Base Goal of 1.7%. After considering additional factors reflecting on the current capacity of DBE's to do work in their market DRMT determined a Step Two adjustment was appropriate to set the goal at 4.6%. Currently DRMT's goal is 4.8%

Fresno COG staff performed a major update to our Bidder's List soliciting NAICS codes, DBE Certifications and purging inactive vendors. The result of this effort has been tabulated and our database now has 258 companies including 13 DBE's, of which 5 are Asian Pacific American, 3 are women, 4 are Hispanic Male and 1 is Subcontinent Asian Male, resulting in a ratio of DBE's to non DBE's of 5.04%. However, as both the DRMT Disparity Study and our bidders list calculations are less than the goal calculated using the CUCP and U.S. Census Bureau's County Business Patterns, staff proposes a 7.14% goal is a valid reflection of DBE's willing and able to do business in our market area.

#### IV. ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

#### A. Final Fiscal Year 2021-22 Overall Work Program (Robert Phipps) [ACTION]

Mr. Phipps (FCOG) reported that The final fiscal year (FY) 2021-22 Overall Work Program (OWP), totaling just over \$35 million, is submitted for Board and public review. The final document increased \$55,000 from the draft budget release in February to cover the cost of a required Triennial Performance Audit.

The proposed budget increased \$7.22 million from last year. The largest part of the increase is attributed to a \$5 million FTA 5339 grant awarded to FCRTA for its maintenance facility. Another significant factor affecting this increase is that the budget contains fully funded multi-year projects, and as these "one-time" funds are spent they are not reflected in subsequent years' budgets. Generally, operating expenses are not affected this way.

Federal revenues increased 19 percent (\$2 million), mostly associated with the previously mentioned FTA 5339 grant. However, an additional \$1.1 million in FTA 5310 apportionments will also be distributed to transit operators for bus procurement. Kings County Association of Governments, (KCAG) agreed to transfer \$325,000 in FHWA planning funds to perform a Valleywide household travel survey.

State revenues decreased 257 percent (\$4,588,834). The largest portion of this decrease centers around the State Regional Early Action Planning grant (REAP), which this year provided \$10 million to Fresno and Central Valley MPOs to assist local governments with housing plans and produce Valleywide activities for housing as well. Staff anticipates spending approximately \$3 million of that and carrying over the balance into next year's budget. Specific budget and activity highlights follow.

**Staffing & Benefits** - There are no new Fresno COG planning positions included in this year's proposed budget. Contingencies are carried for merit-based salary increases as well as for anticipated health insurance increases. The overall proposed budget for salaries increased by 4 percent and benefits by 3 percent.

**Consulting** -The overall consulting budget is \$10.7 million, which is a decrease of \$107,450, corresponding to projects associated with revenue reductions discussed above regarding multi-year projects. New consulting projects are discussed below under the work element discussion.

**Measure C Commuter Vanpool Subsidy** - The budget decreased \$228,000 reflecting reduced activity from COVID restrictions.

Measure C Farm Worker Vanpool Subsidy - The budget decreased \$175,000, reflecting reduced activity from COVID restrictions.

**FTA Section 5339** - This is a new \$10.2 million budget for FCRTA's maintenance facility infrastructure. FCRTA will match the federal funds with \$5.1 million.

Agency Pass Through - This account decreased by \$3.2 million related to the State REAP funds paid to Valley COGs.

After an opportunity for public comment, Mayor Ontiveros (Sanger) motioned and Mayor Yep (Kerman) seconded to approve Fresno COG's FINAL 2021-22 Overall Work Program and budget. The motion passed.

WHEREAS, the Fresno Council of Governments (COG) has been designated the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for Fresno County by the Secretary of the Business and Transportation Agency pursuant to Section 29532 of the California Code of Regulations (as amended by AB 402, 1977); and acting as the Metropolitan Planning Agency (MPO) (Federal Highway Act of 1974 and the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, pursuant to the joint regulations-Code of Federal Regulations, Title 26, Part 450; Title 49, Part 613); and

WHEREAS, the COG is a recipient of Federal financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, the COG, as a condition of grant award, is required to adopt a goal for disadvantaged enterprise (DBE) participation in COG awarded contracts where federal financial assistance is provided pursuant to Code of Federal Regulations, Title 49, Part 26, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Transit Administration requires adoption of a three year DBE goal setting program, to be adjusted on an annual basis to reflect changes in participation rates, and

WHEREAS, The goal applies to a variety of technical transportation and air quality related studies funded by Federal Highways, and Federal Transit Administration programs itemized in the Fresno COG 2021-22 Overall Work Program and budget. Also included is a Federal Transit Administration 5339 grants passed for transit infrastructure. The triennial DBE goal takes into consideration the availability of certified DBE's in Fresno COG's local market area and the California Unified Certification Program. It also considers a Disparity Study done by the state Department of Transportation which determined three groups exhibited disparity indices substantially below parity and are presumed to be disadvantaged; Black American, Hispanic American and Native American. Two additional groups displayed disparity indices below parity but did not reach the threshold considered substantial; White Woman-Owned Business and Subcontinent Asian American, and

WHEREAS, COG anticipates meeting their goal using 100% Race Neutral measures, however COG reserves the right to use Race Conscious Measures should they be warranted, and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the COG adopt the 2021-22 through 2023-24 DBE goal at 7.14% to be applied in federally assisted contract awards using Race Neutral means.

### The Fresno Council of Governments Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program

**Definitions of Terms** – The terms used in this program have the meanings defined in 49 CFR 26.5

**Objectives (26.1)** The Fresno Council of Governments (FCOG) hereby establishes a program in accordance with regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), 49 CFR Part 26. It is the policy of FCOG;

To ensure non discrimination in the award and administration of DOT assisted contracts; To create a level playing field on which DBEs can compete fairly for DOT assisted contracts; To ensure that the FCOG DBE program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law; To ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR Part 26 eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs;

To remove barriers to participation of DBEs in DOT assisted contracts:

To assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the marketplace outside the DBE program;

**Subject funds (26.3)** The FCOG currently receives federal Section 5310 and 5339 funds from FTA and Section 5303, 5304, 5311(f), and FHWA PL funds from Caltrans that require a DBE program.

**Nondiscrimination (26.7)** The FCOG will never exclude any person from participation in, deny any person benefits of, or otherwise discriminate against anyone in connection with the award and performance of any contract covered by 49 CFR Part 26 on the basis of race, color, sex, or national origin. In administering its DBE program, the FCOG will not, directly or through contractual or other arrangements, use criteria or methods of administration that have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishments of the objectives of the DBE program with respect to individuals of a particular race, color, sex, or national origin. The FCOG Executive Director will sign assurance, applicable to all DOT assisted contracts and their administration as part of the grant document, contract, or program supplement agreement for each project.

**Record Keeping (26.11)** FCOG will create and maintain a bidders list, consisting of information about all DBE and non-DBE firms that bid or quote on its DOT-assisted contracts. The bidders list will include the name, address, DBE status, age of the firm, and annual gross receipts of firms.

Prime contractors are required to maintain records and document payments to DBEs for three years following the performance of the contract. These records will be made available for inspection upon request by any authorized representative on FCOG, Caltrans, FHWA, or DOT. This reporting requirement also extends to any certified DBE subcontractor.

Payments to DBE subcontractors will be reviewed by the FCOG to ensure that the actual amount paid to DBE subcontractors equals or exceed the dollar amounts stated in the schedule of DBE participation.

FCOG will report semi-annual DBE Uniform reports to FTA and Caltrans Offfice of Interregional Planning on June 1<sup>st</sup> and December 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.

FCOG will report final utilization of DBE participation to DLAE using Exhibit 17-F of the Caltrans LAPM.

FCOG will safeguard from disclosure to third parties information that may reasonably be regarded as confidential business information, consistent with Federal, state, or local laws.

**Assurances (26.13)** Each financial assistance agreement FCOG signs with DOT shall include the following assurance.

The FCOG shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the award of and performance of any DOT assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR Part 26. The FCOG shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT assisted contracts. The FCOG's DBE Program, as required by 49 CFR Part 26 and as approved by DOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this agreement. Upon notification to the FCOG of its failure to carry out its approved program, the Department may impose sanctions as provided for under Part 26 and may in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C. 3801 et seg.).

The following assurance will be included in each DOT funded contract signed with a contractor (and each subcontract the prime contractor signs with a subcontractor).

The contractor, sub recipient or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 26 in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract and such other remedy as the recipient deems appropriate.

**DBE Program Updates (26.21)** The FCOG will continue to carry out this program until the FCOG has established a new goal setting methodology or until significant changes to this DBE Program are adopted. FCOG will provide to Caltrans a proposed overall goal and goal setting methodology and other program updates by June 1 of every year.

**Policy Statement (26.23)** A policy statement describing the DBE proram shall be available on FCOGs official website and circulated throughout the FCOG organization including the Technical Advisory Committee, the Policy Advisory Committee, the FCOG Board and upon request, to the DBE and non-DBE communities that perform services to FCOG on DOT-assisted contracts.

**Liaison Officer (26.25)** The FCOG Finance Director is designated as liaison officer. The Finance Director has direct, independent access to the FCOG Executive Director concerning DBE program matters.

**Financial Institutions (26.27)** To the extent that FCOG uses financial institutions, FCOG will investigate services offered by institutions owned or controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged individuals and make reasonable efforts to use these institutions. To the extent that FCOG prime contractors use local financial institutions, FCOG will encourage prime contractors to use such local DBE owned or controlled institutions.

**Prompt Payment (26.29)** The agency shall hold retainage from the prime contractor and shall make prompt and regular incremental acceptances of portions, as determined by the agency of the contract work and pay retainage to the prime contractor base on these acceptances. The prime contractor or subcontractor shall return all monies withheld in retention from a subcontractor within 30 days after receiving payment for work satisfactorily completed and accepted including incremental acceptances of portions of the contract work by the agency. Federal regulation (49 CFR 26.29) requires that any delay or postponement of payment over 30 days may take place only for good cause and with the agency's prior written approval. Any violation of this provision shall subject the violating prime contractor or subcontractor to penalties, sanctions, and other remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the California Business and

Professions Code. These requirements shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies otherwise, available to the prime contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment, or non payment by the prime contractor, deficient subcontract performance, or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This provision applies to both DBE and non-DBE prime contractors and subcontractors.

**DBE Directory (26.31)** FCOG subscribes to the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Quarterly Directory published by Caltrans Civil Rights Department and downloads the Calcert Extract file from Caltrans Civil Rights Departments website to have access to the information in database form. Information from the DBE Directory is available to interested persons, contractors, and the public upon request. Additional DBE information can be found at Caltrans Business Enterprise Program website at http://www.dot.ca.gov/hq/bep.

**Over concentration (26.33)** FCOG has not identified any types of work in DOT assisted contracts that have an over concentration of DBE participation. If in the future FCOG identifies the need to address over concentration, measures for addressing over concentration will be submitted to the DLAE for approval.

**Business Development Programs (26.35)** FCOG does not have a business development or mentor-protégé program. If the FCOG identifies the need for such a program in the future, the rationale for adopting such a program and a comprehensive description of it will be submitted to the DLAE for approval.

**Program Monitoring (26.37)** Request for Proposal on all DOT-assisted projects issued by FCOG will include FCOG requirements for DBE participation. Contracts awarded having an agreed amount of DBE participation will include language that DBE percentages will be maintained as set forth in the contract and that the Contractor shall not assign, subcontract, or change subcontractors without express written permission from FCOG.

Procurements wherein a DBE Contract Goal is stipulated will contain provisions requiring the contractor to report payments to DBE subcontractors. The contractor shall maintain records showing the name and address of each subcontractor, the date of payment, and total dollar figure paid to each subcontractor. DBE prime contractors shall also show the date of work performed by their own forces along with the corresponding dollar value of the work claimed toward DBE goals. If the contractors report contains discrepancies from the agreed to usage of DBE subcontractors, type of work DBE subcontractors expected to perform, or amount of payment DBE subcontractors receive, FCOG will notify the contractor of the apparent discrepancy and potential loss of payment. Based on the contractor's response, FCOG will take appropriate action. If the contractor fails to adequately explain why there is discrepancy, payment for the disputed work will be withheld and a letter sent to the contractor referencing the applicable violation and the required withholding of payment.

When a DBE substitution is requested, FCOG will require a letter from the contractor explaining why substitution is needed. FCOG will review the letter to be sure names and addresses are shown, dollar values are included, and reason for the request is explained. If the contractor is not meeting the contract goal with this substitution, the contractor must provide good faith effort to the FCOG for local agency consideration.

#### 26.39 Fostering Small Business Participation

A requirement of good faith effort implementation of the DBE Program, includes the active implementation of a DBE Program to foster small business participation. Contracting requirements shall be structured to facilitate competition by small businesses, taking all reasonable steps to eliminate obstacles to their participation, including unnecessary and unjustified bundling of contract requirements that may preclude small business participation as prime contractors or subcontractors.

In meeting a portion of Fresno COG's overall goal projected to meet through race-neutral measures, a reasonable number of prime contracts are to be of a size that small businesses, including DBEs, can reasonably perform. The size of the small business shall be in accordance with 26.65.

The DBE Program is open to all small businesses, including DBEs, regardless of their location, and there are no limits on the number of contracts that can be awarded to firms participating in the DBE Program. Every effort will be made to avoid creating barriers.

Assistance shall be provided to small business, including DBEs, in overcoming barriers to DBE Program participation in all methods of procurement. Businesses requiring management and technical assistance can be identified through unsolicited requests for assistance.

Fresno COG staff and DBE Program contact shall offer the following assistance to DBEs and other small businesses:

Information on its organization and contractual needs;

Instructions for preparation of bid specifications, procurement policy procedures, and general bid requirements;

Information on specific reasons for unsuccessful bids through debriefing sessions;

Projected procurement opportunities;

Instruction of job performance requirements;

Referrals to firms who offer advice and assistance through mentor-protégé programs,

**National Aspirational Goal (26.41)** The Secretary has determined that nationwide, not less than 10 percent of DOT authorized funds are to be expended with DBE's. This 10 percent goal is a national aspirational goal that DOT uses as a tool in evaluating and monitoring DBE opportunities. The national goal does not authorize or require recipients to set overall or contract goals at the 10 percent level, or to take any special administrative steps if their goals are above or below 10 percent.

**Quotas, and Set Asides (26.43)** FCOG will not use quotas or set asides on DOT assisted contracts under any circumstances.

**Goal Setting (26.45)** FCOG shall establish an overall goal on DBE participation. The overall goal is not a quota, rather it is a guideline on the level of DBE participation FCOG would expect in the absence of discrimination. The overall goal shall provide for participation by all certified DBEs and is not subdivided into group specific goals. The overall goal is based on the relative availability of DBEs in FCOGs contracting market.

The over all goal will be calculated in two steps. A "base figure" to determine the relative availability of DBEs in our contracting market will be calculated. In step 2, the base figure is evaluated to determine the current capacity of DBEs to perform work.

An initial base figure is developed by consulting the Census Bureau's County Business Pattern (CBP) database to determine the number of ready, willing, and able business' available in the geographic area. The Calcert Extract DBF file, available from Caltrans Civil Rights website, is downloaded and browsed to determine the amount of certified DBE's soliciting work in the corresponding geographic area. The DBE's is divided by the number of all firms to determine the base figure.

The base figure is then evaluated and adjusted to determine the current capacity of DBEs to perform work. To do this FCOG will maintain a bidders list to determine the number of DBEs that have bid or quoted on DOT assisted contracts. The evaluation of the base figure may take into consideration , including but not limiting to , the volume of work DBEs have performed in recent years. The adjusted figure becomes the overall goal.

The overall goal is then stated as a percentage of all DOT funds budgeted for expenditure on contracting pursuant to the FCOG Overall Work Program.

FCOG will adopt the overall goal at a noticed public hearing to allow for consultation with minority, women's and general contractor groups, community organizations, and other officials or organizations which could be expected to have information concerning the availability of disadvantaged and non-discrimination opportunities for DBEs, and FCOG's efforts to establish a level playing field for the participation of DBE's.

FCOG will publish a public notice in general circulation media and on FCOG's official internet web site announcing the adopted overall goal, describing how it was selected, inviting inspection during normal business hours at FCOG's office for 30 days following the date of notice, informing the public that FCOG will accept comments on the goals for 45 days from the date of the notice and providing addresses to which comments may be sent.

FCOG will also publish the proposed and adopted goal on its official internet web site under the heading Agenda/Info. <a href="https://www.fresnocog.org">www.fresnocog.org</a>

Failure to Meet Goal (26.47) The requirement of the rule is to get maximum feasible DBE participaton through race-netrual means. In the event of a failure to meet a triennial DBE goal for any given fiscal year FCOG is committed to analyzing the reasons behind the failure. A significant portion of FCOG contracting may occur early in the year so if DBE participation lags, FCOG may not have the contracting capacity remaining in the budget year to make realistic adjustments in the current fiscal year. For this reason FCOG will take into consideration the success or failure of obtaining previous goals when analyzing a failure to meet the anticipated annual goal for a given fiscal year. If a failure occurs in the first or second year of a triennial period, the analysis will focus on increasing participaton in the second or third year respectively with the intent overall DBE participaton will meet or exceed the triennial goal during the three year period. If the failure occurs in the final year of the triennial period the analysis will take into consideration the success or failure during the first two years and if the participaton has been inadequate to meet the overall goal over the trinneal period, analysis will focus to enhance contracting opportunities during the subsequent triennial period. Corrective actions include primarialy race netural means such as increasing outreach to the business community, offering technicial assistance and advice to potential contractors or modifying the procurement process to favor small business operators. Should race netural means prove inadequate to generate additional participation, FCOG may consider race-concious means such as outreaching directly to DBE groups or individuals registered in the CUPCU or setting individual goals for specific contracts.

**Procurement of Transit Vehicles (26.49)** FCOG commits to acquiring Transit Vehicles from Transit Vehicle Manufactures (TVM) listed on FTA's certified list or who have submitted a methodology to FTA that has been approved or not disapproved at the time of the solicitation. If FCOG procures a Transit Vehicle from a non TVM the procuremnent will be included in FCOG's triennial DBE goal or with FTA approval, in a project-specific goal. FCOG will report TVM procurement information to FTA within 30 days of making an award.

**Meeting the Overall Goal (26.51)** FCOG's intent is to consistently exceed its DBE goal established under 49 CFR part 23 without using Race-conscious measures. The FCOG fully anticipates that it will consistently meet and exceed its goal under 49 CFR part 26 using Race-neutral measures exclusively. Race-neutral measures include;

Awarding a contract that has no DBE goal to a contractor with DBE subcontractors. Arranging solicitations and firm selection in ways that facilitate DBE participation. Negotiating bonding and insurance requirements in ways that facilitate DBE participation. Disseminating the DBE directory to prime bidders upon request.

Good Faith Efforts Procedures (26.53) In the situation whereby apparently, the overall goal will not be met, FCOG may choose to narrowly tailor the program to overcome the effects of discrimination by using race conscious measures. This includes the establishment of contract goals and the use of Good Faith efforts to the point that the overall goal will be met. If during the

course of a year in which FCOG is using contract goals, FCOG determines that the overall goal will be met or exceeded, the use of contract goals will be reduced or eliminated to the extent necessary to ensure that the use of race-conscious measures does not result in exceeding the overall goal. Good Faith efforts on the part of FCOG include recording;

Advertisement for DBE participation in newspapers, trade papers, and minority focus papers. The dates when notices were mailed soliciting bids for projects and the names and DBE status of the consultants on the mailing list.

The items of work made available, including breaking down contracts into economically feasible units to facilitate DBE participation.

A summary of negotiations, bidder selection, the name of the firm selected and a listing of firms and DBE status who submitted bids but were not accepted.

Any additional data to support demonstration of good faith effort.

Upon solicitations of DOT-assisted contracts with contract goals, FCOG will not deny award to contractors on the basis of DBE goals, who demonstrate that they have used good faith efforts to meet the goal. Good faith efforts on the part of contractors include;

Documenting that they can meet the required goal.

Documenting that they made good faith efforts to meet the goal, even though they did not succeed in obtaining enough DBE participation to do so.

Contractors selected on the basis of a DBE goal must provide the following information with the initial proposal or before entering into a contractual agreement with FCOG:

- 1. The names and addresses of the DBE firms.
- 2. A description of the work each DBE will provide.
- 3. The dollar amount of participation by each DBE.
- 4. Proof of DBE certification.
- 5. Written documentation of the bidder/offeror's commitment to use a DBE subcontractor whose participation it submits to meet a contract goal.
- 6. The prime contractor must receive FCOG consent prior to terminating, removing, or replacing a DBE subcontractor.
- 7. If a DBE subcontractor is terminated or removed and the prime contractor cannot find a new DBE subcontractor as replacement the prime contractor must demonstrate good faith efforts in finding a replacement DBE firm.
  - 6. If the contract goal is not met, evidence of good faith efforts must be provided.

If FCOG determines that the apparent successful bidder has failed to meet the DBE requirement of the solicitation or to document good faith efforts, FCOG will notify the bidder that they have 10 days to request administrative reconsideration. As part of this reconsideration the bidder will have the opportunity to provide written documentation or argument concerning the issue of whether it met the goal or made adequate good faith efforts to do so. The determination of the reconsideration will be made by the FCOG Executive Director or Deputy Director. The bidder will be offered the opportunity to meet with the reconsideration official to discuss the issue. A written notification will be sent to the bidder explaining the basis for the reconsideration finding. The result of the reconsideration is not appealable to Caltrans, FHWA, FTA, or DOT.

**Counting DBE Participation (26.55)** FCOG will count DBE participation toward overall and contract goals as provided in contract specifications for the prime contractor, subcontractor, joint venture partner with prime or subcontractor, or vendor of material or supplies (see 26.37).

**Small Business Size (26.65)** To be an eligible DBE, a firm, including affiliates, must be an existing small business and be withing the thresholds defined by Small Business Administration by NACIS code for annual receipts or number of employees and have less that \$23.98 million or an amount as adjusted by the Secretary, in annual receipts over the last three fiscals years,

**Certification (26.83)** FCOG ensures that only DBE firms currently certified per 29 CFR Part 26 will participate as DBE in our program. Such certification must be issued by Caltrans, FHWA, FTA, DOT, MPO, City, County, or State in accordance with 29 CFR Part 26.

Information, Confidentiality, cooperation, intimidation, or retaliation (26.109) FCOG will respond to request for information in compliance with the Federal Freedom of Information and Privacy Acts (5 U.S.C. 552 and 552a). FCOG shall safeguard from disclosure to any unauthorized persons information that may reasonably be considered confidential business information consistent with state, federal, and local law. All participants in FCOG DBE program shall cooperate fully and promptly with DOT. Participants in the FCOG DBE program must not intimidate, threaten, coerce, or discriminate against any individual or firm that has made a complaint, testified, assisted, or participated in any manner in an investigation, proceeding, or hearing under this part. Violiation of a provision of the section shall be grounds for denial of certification, removal of eligibility for future participation and or suspension and debarment.

The intent of this procedure is to implement the federal requirements of 49 CFR 26 as required by the Department of Transportation. Federal legislation is subject to revision and interpretation by congress and various regulatory agencies. If a conflict of wording or intent exist between this procedure and the federal regulations, the most recent amended federal statutes take precedence.
